

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Spotl	ight:	HOUR of CODE
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When I was in grade school, we learned about computers on machines such as the PET, TRS80, and Apple Ile. Low resolution graphics were "thrilling" and programming opportunities included LOGOWriter, BASIC and PASCAL. Computer education in 2015 might not appear to be the same, but the concept of 'programming' is still very much alive. This week, December 7-13, is Computer Science Education Week and we are celebrating with our second annual Hour of Code. The Hour of Code is a global movement reaching tens of millions of students in 180+ countries. The goal is for every student to try the computer programming known as "coding" for one hour.

This week Ms. Diehl, our technology teacher, kicked off the Hour of Code with grade level assemblies to help children understand what coding is all about. We will continue next week by having each class participate in the Hour of Code tutorials. From December 14 – January 2 students will be participating in a school-wide competition to see how many lines of code we can write. Students are invited to work at home and at school to complete as many lines as they can. On Monday, December 21, the computer lab will be open to students from 8:00am – 8:40am for a morning of code. All are welcome!

Our goal is to get children to think, create, and have fun — all while experiencing computer programming. We want to show that anyone can learn the basics of programming and become a maker, a creator, or an innovator. The Long Island Chess Nuts is a non-profit organization, whose goals are to promote the educational and positive benefits of chess to all children. The organization, currently celebrating its 20th year, has grown to include over 2,000 members, many of whom are scholastic chess champions. It is "the largest organization on Long Island where children can advance their chess skills," as quoted in The NY Times (Mar. 15, 1998); and it "provides a regular schedule of play and instruction for school-age children...[in] the sport of kings," Newsday (Dec. 12, 1998). It has also been featured on Nickelodeon, and TV Channels 29 and 12. It has been in the top ten of all chess clubs in the U.S. since 2010, as reported by the U.S. Chess Federation. Margarita Lanides, its director, was the recipient of the prestigious 2006 New York State Chess Association Hall of Fame Award. Sponsors and supporters of the Long Island Chess Nuts have included Citibank, Roosevelt Field, Anton Newspapers, Sears, and many others. It is also a member of the Garden City Chamber of Commerce.



Laura Schroff, New York Times bestselling author of 'An Invisible Thread', is coming to Cold Spring Harbor!


